Street Sex Workers' Discourse: Realizing Material Change Through Agential Choice

Speaker: Dr. Jill McCracken

Based on personal interviews with street-based sex workers, McCracken argues that the conditions in which they live—physical, emotional, and intellectual—are reproduced and further entrenched by the language used to talk about their work. This book challenges some of the more prevalent academic and lay understandings about street prostitution as well as society's role in maintaining sex workers' marginalization.
